

The Prussian Queen: a Unique Historic Inn

The isolated country pub in the Lincolnshire Marsh village of Saltfleetby All Saints, a mile from a coastal nature reserve. An old inn with an unusual mysterious name, and a very eventful history:

The site of a rare *Dutch* auction; accidentally bombed by the RAF; at the forefront of defence from invasion in the Napoleonic Wars,

First and Second World Wars; bankruptcy; fatal accidents; a hidden absentee; the site of many tragedies and celebrations; visited by notable figures; a hub of village life and tradition for centuries.
